



NATIVITY 85 YEARS AGO – FURTHER REFLECTION



Nativity is 85 this year. Here are some of the events, 85 years ago, in November of 1933, that were occurring the year that like-minded people established our church.

- In November, U.S. President Roosevelt unveils the Civil Works Administration (better known as the New Deal), an organization designed to create jobs for more than 4 million unemployed;
- “the great black blizzard” of North Dakota strips topsoil from desiccated farmlands (one of a series of disastrous dust storms that year);
- Girl Scout cookies were “created”;
- the Soviet Union was formally recognized by the United States;
- William Dick, aged 76, died (Mr. Dick was a Mohican Indian believed to be the last person who could speak the Mohican language, which was never written down);
- Thanksgiving Day was moved from the last Thursday of November to November 23 at the request of business leaders for department store marketing purposes;
- the space race between the United States and the Soviet Union begins after the Soviet Union takes a balloon to more than 60,000 feet in altitude, the United States two months later achieves 61,237 feet;
- the first purported photograph of the Loch Ness monster was taken.



Superheroes of the Bible


What's the Church Council doing?
