

#### **SUNDAY IS COMING!**

As we move into the bright light of Easter in April, we look at our journey to get here. Both the forty day journey of Lent and the year we have been through.

Last year at this time as we prepared to record our Easter Service in the sanctuary, having quickly learned how to worship online during that first month of Covid, my worship assistant got a phone call with the first news of its kind in our congregation. Her daughter likely had covid. After praying, she went home to quarantine and I stayed and recorded the service on my own.

There has been much difficult news and sacrifice during this last year. Not worshipping together or using our church building actively for the last year has been a challenge to our membership and small community. These experiences were definitely on my mind and I know yours in our Lenten journeys this year. In the Bible studies I led on Wednesdays, I chose Biblical stories of LIGHT. As we leaned into the original meaning of Lent as a "lengthening" of days in the spring, We were able to appreciate the days getting lighter and brighter. Through our Lenten journey in Scripture, we learned more about who we are and who God is while we lean into the light of Christ and celebrate his resurrection with the Easter sun!

I'm reminded of the photograph I brought home from my pastoral internship year in Hawaii. It's of an Easter Sunday in Honolulu in the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century of the famous outdoor sunrise service people drove to at the top of the Punchbowl volcano crater that sits above the city (see picture on p. 2). We are living into that same light of Easter, and hoping for an end to the pain of this long Friday.

When I think about this last year, I remember hearing the evangelical preacher Tony Campolo say the famous line, "It's Friday, but Sunday is coming!" when I heard him speak at the church around the block from the church I served in Honolulu. This year has been a long Friday, (as in Good Friday), when we remember that Jesus is in the mire with us, and that while we have hopes and expectations for change, sometimes we don't get to see them through the clouds and shadows of affliction and disappointment.

The promise is of course that Sunday is coming, and now we see it here at First Lutheran and in communities around the country, as numbers have dipped down and more people have become vaccinated. As of this printing, we don't know of the news if there is a date and a plan to open yet, but we lean into the light, recognizing the lessons we have learned during this Friday and waiting to see the sun of the Easter morning and the hope it brings in Jesus Christ, and our lives together.



#### **ENCOURAGE WONDER**

For a new perspective on Bible accounts you've heard over and over, play "I Wonder" with children and adults alike. Similar to "I Spy," it encourages a deeper dive into familiar passages. Simply explore ideas that aren't detailed in the Bible, starting with the phrase "I wonder." For example:

- I wonder if any Roman soldier was standing in the back *not* mocking Jesus (Matthew 27:27-31). If so, what was he thinking as others threw about insults?
- I wonder how long it took Joseph of Arimathea to cut his own tomb out of the rock (Matthew 27:57-60). What did he think about as he worked?

The day after Jesus' ascension, I wonder which disciple spoke first at breakfast — and what he said. Scholars may have chimed in on some of these ponderings, but there's likely no right answer. Playing "I Wonder" can help you slow down to really pay attention and experience more of a Bible passage — especially one you seem to know by rote.

Add meaning to this year's Easter celebration by letting your wonder wander during Holy Week. Then continue the practice whenever you're eager to gain new insights on the "old, old story ... of Jesus and his love." —Janna Firestone
