From the Pastor....

WHEN IT SEEMS NOTHING IS SACRED IN THE HOLY LAND

We have seen the photos, the viral videos, and the news segments. We hear the stories that are shared by witnesses and journalists. The terrorist attacks on people in Israel by Hamas soldiers and others are horrific and violently antisemitic. They are intended to conjure our worst nightmares of fear and powerlessness and must be unequivocally condemned. At the same time, we see the images of desperation after water and electricity were shut off in Gaza that make us long for a way to protect those who didn't ask for this fight. We hear interviews with Christians who say they are caught in the crossfire of a holy war between their neighbors. It was hard to know what to think when an Anglican Hospital full of refugees was bombed, and many rushed to judgement without evidence. Images of parents looking for children and children looking for parents amongst rubble are terrifying and traumatic. Babies are targets of terrorist brutality, while grandparents are paraded as prisoners of war-acts that announce a cruelty that we would rather not know existed. These scenes may have our full attention But, what do we do about it? How do we talk about what is happening? Do we feel so overwhelmed with despair that we turn it off or try not to think about it? Is there any hope for peace among peoples in this holiest of lands for three religions?

It may be easiest for us to say these people have been fighting in this place for centuries and will continue to fight but that is too easy a way to write off our responsibility in this, both as Christians and as citizens of the world. When we see violence like this it is a failure of humanity not just a few people or nations. I don't think Jesus would want us to write whole peoples off or look the other way when individuals are harmed. That doesn't necessarily mean we need to stay out of it unless we pick a side or have a simplistic either -or approach.

We can be on the side of Jesus and the kingdom's values in this situation and respond with that as our inspiration, even if we don't have a perfect answer or plan. As part of our First family, we share values that shape not only how we treat each other but how we speak and act when faced with situations like we see in Israel, Gaza, the West Bank, and occupied territories of Palestine. first the kingdom of God, we seek and share values that care for "our neighbors throughout creation". When we at First seek to be "Inclusive and Kind" that is applied to our neighbors near and far and allows us to lean on our community's words when we personally may be speechless. We say "We strive to form an intergenerational culture of active love for all people, and respect for the dignity of each individual, especially if they have been excluded elsewhere. We are curious about each person's unique story and perspective and seek to learn from each other and the world around us." To me that means that when we are confronted with these atrocities in the Holy Land, we name that we value every human life and promote human rights in all situations including this one. That may promote counter-cultural values in a situation where enemy images, rage, and vengeance can so easily dehumanize the Israeli to the Palestinian and the Palestinian to the Israeli.

To us at home when we watch or turn off this news or any news, we also may be dehumanizing those who suffer—when we look the other way or say nothing will bring needed change. We speak to these ideas in our values when we seek to be Transformative, claiming that "As 21st Century disciples we carry on the voice of the prophets, Jesus and courageous Christians when we believe God can use us to change lives, communities, institutions and systems by reflecting and promoting the counter-cultural values and practices we learn from Jesus." For me aligning with prophetic values means believing that the way things are, are not the way things always will be. Change is possible and peace is still possible even in situations that seem hopeless. Making that claim in the face of what we are watching and hearing from the Holy Land is a powerful witness to a kingdom not of this world and for its values that we strive toward and witness to as we live within this world that God loves.

However, you find yourself responding to what is happening in the Holy Land I ask as your pastor that you try to align with the values of the kingdom in how you respond internally, in speech, and in action, by recognizing the value and dignity of every human and not giving up hope for change even in seemingly hopeless situation.

I hope those steps towards our values during these times can lead us to other steps and actions to aid and support a long-term peace in the Middle East and elsewhere as we speak out against ongoing war and repeated cycles of violence and revenge. We do not claim to have the answers and solutions as outsiders to people who actually live in this situation of ethnic and religious tension and the reality of acts of violence. But, we can listen to all people and sides and claim the values of the kingdom in responding to what we see and hear. I pray it also inspires us to act to aid people who are suffering near and far and support all those who desire change.

Per LWR: Most often recipients use their LWR quilts to shield against the cold and rain. The versatility of the quilts also makes them useful as simple tents, floor coverings or a wrap to hold a baby on his mother's back.

Since we quilters here at FLC began keeping count in 1979, we've made 2,249 LWR quilts!

Festive Cranberry Salad


1 Can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk $\frac{1}{4}$ C lemon juice

- 1 can (20 oz) crushed pineapple, drained 1 can (16 oz) whole-berry cranberry sauce
- 2 C miniature marshmallows
- $\frac{1}{2}$ C chopped pecans

Red food coloring (optional)

1 carton (8 oz) froze whipped topping, thawed

In a bowl combine milk and lemon juice. Mix well. Stir in the pineapple, cranberry sauce, marshmallows, pecans and food coloring. Fold in whipped topping. Spoon into a 9 x 13 baking dish. Freeze until firm - 4 hrs. or overnight. Cut into squares.

TRIP TO THE JEWISH MUSEUM

Several members of our Tuesday Morning Bible Study group went on the road in October and hope to do so more in the coming months. It's something the Bible Study used to do on occasion, and we want to revive that tradition. My wife Sarah, who is a museum curator, and my baby daughter Pearl joined us on our trip to the Jewish Museum on Milwaukee's East Side. It's a wonderful museum that presents meaningful and powerful displays within a compact space. We came to see the quilts and textiles that were part of the special exhibit "Women Pulling at the Threads of Social Discourse". We also learned about the story of the giant textile master tapestry "Jeremiah" by Marc Chagall that hangs above that exhibit.

We spent much of our time learning about the history of the Jewish People and religious practices that shape their religious communities. It was easy to notice how the material lined up with what we read in the Bible and have been learning about in our Bible studies over the last two years focused on understanding Jesus' historical and cultural background. Of particular interest was the story of Jewish Immigration to Milwaukee. We saw familiar names and places and learned some new information. Did you know that the Jewish street peddler tradition in Milwaukee lasting longer than anywhere else?

It seemed timely to be learning about how people in Milwaukee perceived the rise of Hitler and the persecution of the Jews in Europe, shortly after the largest attack on the Jewish population since the Holocaust had just occurred in Israel. We were able to talk to the museum historian about Golda Meir's Milwaukee roots and her role in forming the State of Israel. We also talked with the staff about how they were doing and responding to these attacks and the retaliation of the Israeli military against Hamas, sometimes with civilian casualties. It was clear that we all desired peace and mourned the loss of Jewish and Palestinian lives as a result of the terrorist attacks and violence in the region. We hope for a peaceful region in the days to come.


